### Champagne and stars



Are you ready, old sport? The green light is on for

Wellington Repertory Theatre's production of *The* Great Gatsby, which will coat Gryphon Theatre in lavish opulence even as it peeks behind the curtain from the 29<sup>th</sup> of October to the 8<sup>th</sup> of November. A story that requires little introduction, F. Scott Fitzgerald's classic novel is set in Jazz Age, prohibition-era New York during the roaring twenties - the summer of 1922, to be precise - and was written exactly 100 years ago in 1925. Interestingly, it wasn't a commercial success, selling fewer than 23,000 copies in its first year. Today, it is widely celebrated: a tale of love and loss, greed and envy with an instantly recognisable aesthetic that continues to sparkle and shine on screens and stages around the world. Ken Duncum's adaptation brings it to life in a way that is faithful to the original, director Catherine McMechan says, but that also makes for compelling theatre. "In bringing this adaptation to the stage we hope to


give audiences a better understanding of a story that is often misunderstood, thanks to a superb script that focuses on the drama and the tragedy behind the glitz and the glamour." Well-known New Zealand playwright Duncum has indicated his aim was to make this adaptation 'light

### your phone or internet provider that you have not been able to resolve



directly, you can complain to Telecommunications Dispute Resolution (TDR) to help resolve the problem. TDR is a free service for consumers and was set up in 2007 to resolve complaints. It consists of an independent chair, three industry representatives, and three consumer representatives. The actual dispute

specialises in dispute resolution, managing complaints, and providing dispute resolution practitioners. The resolution service covers telecommunications providers for around 95 percent of consumers. Consumers have three years to raise a complaint to TDR and as the terms and conditions a customer agrees to will be very important in resolving any dispute, it is vital that these can be provided if a complaint is made. Members of the scheme should ensure they retain records for at least that long so they can be provided if necessary. Those terms and conditions must have been made available to the consumer at the time services were offered. This might be by providing a copy or providing a link if there is proof that this was done. The relevant terms will be those brought to the customer's attention and applying at the time of the event giving rise to the complaint.

The TDR process can involve four phases: talking to the consumer about their complaint to understand what the issues are and how the consumer would like them resolved; facilitating a solution by direct communication between the consumer and provider to reach an agreed outcome; mediation with a Fair Way mediator to assist the parties to agree on an outcome; and adjudication, where a decision will be made after considering evidence and submissions from the consumer and provider. Decisions of the adjudicator are binding on the communications provider, but consumers can still take their case to the Disputes Tribunal or courts if they are not satisfied with the outcome. **NATIONWIDE SERVICE MASTERTON**

It has a diameter of 152,000 light-years and contains a trillion stars. It appears elliptical because we see it almost edge on. It is faint due to its colossal distance of 2,537,000 light-years. The colours of M31 are generated by the dominant





Be swim safe



Drowning and water-related injuries are

preventable tragedies, yet many school children are unprepared. It's important that they learn how to be safe, swim confidently, recognise hazards, and call for help. Confidence in the water should be as natural as confidence on land - and safety should never come at the cost of enjoyment. Enrolling your tamariki in swim classes ahead of the summer season will ensure that they learn to swim confidently, but they also need to know how to respond if the unexpected happens. One of the most important skills anyone can learn is how to float. In the event of a rip or any form of trouble, floating on your back while relaxing and breathing normally will significantly increase chances of survival – that's why it's one of the first things to teach children. If your kids already know how to swim, brush up on some safety tips before the summer begins. These include finding the safest place to swim by assessing conditions and finding the lifeguard flags, if in doubt staying out, and always swimming with a buddy. It's also important to know how to get help if needed: simply raise your arm and call out!

### Nature and history



Of New Zealand's 23 Great Rides, Pou Herenga Tai – Twin Coast Cycle Trail is the only one that allows cyclists to cross from one side of the country to the other. The 87-kilometre trail is nestled into beautiful Northland and stretches from the Bay of Islands to Hokianga Harbour. This scenically spectacular cross-country journey offers a mix of relaxing riding, access to some seriously significant heritage sites and stories, and four distinct sections that can be explored in either direction.

It takes roughly two days to complete the entire trail, depending on your pace and how much time you'd like to allocate to side quests. Whether you're starting from the Bay of Islands or Hokianga Harbour, the central point is Kaikohe and from there the trail descends to the east and west coasts. Many cyclists opt to spend the night either in the centre point or in the nearby Okaihau. Generally flat with gentle climbs, Twin Coast Cycle Trail is mostly Grade 1 and 2 and suitable for most abilities. Weaving through subtropical vegetation, Pou Herenga Tai riders will pass forests of native bush, glimpsing kauri trees and plenty of ponga. It may look like a scene from *Jurassic Park*, but you'll mostly encounter beautiful native birds. As for humans, their stories are woven into the landscape. New Zealand's earliest Māori and European settlements can be found in Northland

through difficult stages of life as I know I will grow


