## A parody of a paradigm

Sandy Burton will now be making a splash with his new comedy special *Tubs of Fun!* at the Newtown Community Centre on the 8th, 9th, 16th, and 17th of May. While under duress of a local hot tub company who have forced their sponsorship upon him, the genre-pushing, 2020 Wellington RAW Comedy Quest-winning, joke-slaying, stay-at-home-dad party starter will present brand-new material that he hopes will submerge audience in litres of laughter. I took the plunge to ask him what the deal is on (hot) Tubs of Fun! What do you love about comedy? I love comedy because when you are bent over in a

fit of hysterical laughter, it has got to be one of the best feelings you can experience on planet Earth. It has the power to suspend you in a moment of absolute, unadulterated joy. As a comedian, you get to create those moments for others, and for me that is an unparalleled natural high. Comedy is a marvellous tool for celebrating a sense of community and communicating ideas. It has an almost divine power to send a message to the brain but also right to the heart. When a joke lands, it causes a bizarre physiological reaction we call laughter – this part of the human experience is still very much shrouded in mystery. It is the mechanics of a joke and how they can cause this response in us that draws me in as a comedian. I believe comedy is an essential part of our survival as it is an antidote to adversity. Paleoanthropologists state that early hominids would strive to instigate laughter when coming across a stranger for the first time. These scientists believe early humans would do this in order to present as a friend rather than foe; to share a moment of laughter together would potentially disarm any threatening advances. Comedy is my love language! How would you describe your style? My style of comedy includes meticulously crafted social commentary that is simultaneously astute and absurd. My shows include a range of routines centred on political satire, anecdotal storytelling,

The through-line of *Tubs of Fun!* is based on the idea of how it is increasingly difficult to discern genuine content from sponsored advertising. Advertorial journalism was once at the forefront of this commercial trickery but with sponsored content now running rife on social media, it has become even more contrived yet also more convincing. Tubs of Fun! is a parody of this paradigm. What do you hope audiences take away from the

overall narrative arc or a commitment to a theme.

## show? My goal with *Tubs of Fun!* is for audiences to escape from the reality of their day-to-day lives. My show is an attempt to explore and push the genre into new territory, to create a live experience that feels totally original.

# A heavy house hitter



Continuing his vibrant journey with unabated momentum, Maxwell Byrne's return to our shores comes off the back of a string of standout sets across North America, new singles, and his Aotearoa debut as 1tbsp late last year. 





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# A word from Maddi...

## Happy NZ Music Month! by Madelaine Empson

I grew up listening to Greg Johnson. The Kiwi musician



recently celebrated the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Vine Street Stories, one of the CDs my dad had in circulation on his car's six-disc carousel player. I had to Google that to remember what they're called, which hit

home, like a Walkman to the face, how much has changed in the music world since then. Same for Greg, who called time "the least understood thing humans have to deal with" when I interviewed him recently ahead of his Vine Street

Stories 30th Anniversary Tour. The album was largely

recorded at Vine Street, St Marys Bay, where he lived

and played throughout the 90s. I asked him to spill a story or two from that time and laughed out loud when he told me: "I had an annual Boxing Day party that started to balloon after the first couple of years until the last one. It started around 11am so pacing yourself was important, but by 1am the entire back lawn had been totally worn off and Peter Urlich was leading

a huge conga line around the house, so when noise control showed up and took the stereo it was actually kind of a relief. I was like, 'OK, time to hit the clubs now everybody, thanks for coming!" Oh, to have been a drunk fly on the wall at one of those legendary parties. Alas, I was only three when Vine Street Stories came out. I've now seen Greg five times live with my dad in a father-daughter gigging tradition that brings me a lot of joy. Of course, we went to the Vine Street concert at Old St Paul's, where I inadvertently caused some absolute scenes. After attempting to squeeze into a pew I thought was a six-seater, but was most certainly a four and sitting in the middle on an awkward diagonal in stone-cold silence, avoiding the death glares from the crushed sardines to our left and right, I squeezed us to the end of another row, then promptly left again to 'use the bathroom' (read: 'go to the bar'). In the line for red wine, I jokingly informed a stranger that the church pulpit was a secret bathroom, then panicked as she nodded and headed in its general direction. of Aotearoa's most diverse and abundant wildlife hotspots, here you can encounter albatross and delve deep underground to uncover some interesting human history as well. The Royal Albatross Centre gives visitors viewing access to the world's only mainland breeding colony

of northern royal albatross. Located at Taiaroa Head Nature Reserve, albatrosses find a sanctuary to raise their young. Born in January and February, the little fluff balls are currently as cute as can be! Royal albatrosses, toroa, are one of the biggest sea birds. A graceful giant, their wingspan exceeds three

metres. Their breeding season takes an entire year, so there is always something to see at the colony. Though they fly an estimated 19,000 kilometres per year and spend over 85 percent of their life out at sea, the northern royal albatross is endemic to New Zealand. At the Royal Albatross Centre, visitors can view the colony from the observatory and learn all about them

on guided tours. Your guide will take you through

the birds' fascinating history before leading you on

a short walk uphill to the observatory to see them rearing their young. Hidden underneath the colony is a military fort established in the 1880s in response to fear of Russian invasion. Optionally added onto the albatross tour, your guide will walk you through the tunnels to see the Armstrong Disappearing Gun and learn about the headland's human history.

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
