



Premiered in January 1934 as a massive success,

in early 1936 the Russian newspaper *Pravda* denounced the opera in an article titled *Muddle* Instead of Music, sending Shostakovich's life into a tailspin. The work was banned in the Soviet Union for almost 30 years, until 1961. Orchestra Wellington music director Marc Taddei has crafted a suite tracing the journey of the opera's protagonist, Katerina, from isolation and passion to betrayal and despair, combining arias and orchestral interludes into a concentrated symphonic portrait. Pierard's powerful voice brings Shostakovich's heroine vividly to life, illuminating both the work's humanity and the reasons it provoked such outrage. Spotlighting an untold battle



In the director's chair is Kiwi Robert Sarkies (Out of the Blue, Consent: The Louise Nicholas Story, Scarfies), who is honoured to "bring the story home" to the families and community who survived it. 
In 1966 the festival was held over Queen's Birthday

- 3. Failing to allow for support persons. Employees have the right to have a support person or representative to help them through the process and be present and speak for them during
- should be taken about what was discussed, and what the employee and employer have agreed to do in order to rectify the performance issues. This reduces misunderstandings. 5. Failing to provide support or training. This may include training courses, mentoring, examples of

the standard of work expected, and other resources

4. Failing to record the outcomes of meetings. Notes

related to performance of their role. Dealing with untrue claims as to experience and skills is a disciplinary issue handled separately. 6. Failing to measure and document progress. Detailed notes should be kept regarding performance at the beginning, during, and at the end of the improvement process. Keep the



Worlds beyond the Solar System by Richard Hall, astronomical communicator Our planet Earth, along with a number of other worlds, orbits

a natural by-product of star formation. Thus, every star should be accompanied by a



This has all changed with discoveries made by giant space telescopes. We can currently confirm the existence of almost 6000 planets around other stars. Many more await confirmation. Think about it. Our galaxy contains approximately 150,000 million stars. If only one in a thousand of these stars has a planet similar to the Earth in size, mass, and climate, Earth-like worlds must number more than a hundred million. And, that is just in

a star that we call the Sun. In

theory, a planetary system is

retinue of planets. However,

until recently we did not have

bright 'Pointer stars' that follow it around the sky. The brighter of the two Pointer stars is Alpha Centauri. It is the third brightest star in the sky and shines with a yellow-white hue. The other Pointer, Agena, is blue-white. The Pointers appear to be close to each other, but this is an illusion. Agena is a giant star, 526 light-years distant, while Alpha Centauri appears brilliant because, on a cosmic scale, it is close to us. Its distance is just 4.4 lightyears. I have always had a fascination for this star. Not just because it is close to us, but because it has
