This can be largely attributed to the decline of primary marine foods (such as krill) and mammalian pests. Tarāpunga are the canary in the coal mine, and their decline

signals a larger issue with the health of our marine ecosystems. Despite these declines, there are some areas where tarāpunga persevere. Over the summer season, there are approximately 6,000 red-billed gulls that breed at Pukekura, and due to predator control efforts and an abundance of natural food,


