There's a little puppet company down there called Terrapin, and they had no puppeteers, so they ran a workshop and invited me to participate. From there, they employed

me to perform in their next show. I was very natural

at the puppetry and loved it, and I was sort of at

a point in my career where I wasn't really enjoying

acting anymore. That was 25-plus years ago, and

I was very fortunate to be in the right place at the right time and fall into a career that has taken me all around the world. What's so wonderful about puppetry is that the focus is always on the puppet, but it has all the elements of theatre that I love. Puppetry involves the audience to invest a little more themselves. Faces have multi-muscles in them to convey emotion and tell stories, whereas a puppet might have only three moving parts. Once you've hooked in the audience, they're placing so much meaning and imagination in the show itself, so it's a real dialogue. There's something about puppets - people place and extract humanity from inanimate objects, so it does work on a deeper level. Also, the variety of roles you can play in puppetry is phenomenal. That first show I played, I was a ballerina's shadow, which broke away from the

efficient, and find new, subtle changes to really bring

the performance to a higher level. We created this show during COVID lockdowns. We did that on an Australian tour, then had six months off, then we went to America, and between that period we were allowed to have some more audience interaction, because in COVID times you couldn't do that. We were able to then refigure some aspects of the show to make it a little more playful with the audience. The kids and the families end up leaving the theatre feeling like they've played games and been part of the action and part of the show. Even with such a hit series behind you, could you fathom the kind of global success the stage show would have? We created it alongside Joe Brumm, Ludo [Studio], and Joff Bush [the primary composer]. One of the biggest challenges that myself and Rosemary Myers, the director, faced was being faithful to Bluey, because it had such significance to people. Having

A long-range coastal battery built to protect Wellington from possible enemy attacks in World War II, Wrights Hill Fortress once held two huge 9.2inch guns that could fire a 172-kilogram shell up to 30 kilometres across the Cook Strait! When first fired, the guns broke many of the fortress windows. After the war, the battery was used for training purposes and the guns were sold as scrap metal. Years of neglect followed, but in 1988, the Karori Lions Club began the restoration process, opening

the doors to the public to give thousands a glimpse into the past. The Wrights Hill Fortress Restoration Society was formed a few years later to preserve the fortress as a historical monument for the benefit of the community. Wrights Hill Fortress is typically open for public viewing four times per year, with the next opportunity coming up on the 6<sup>th</sup> of February for Waitangi Day, followed by Anzac Day, King's

Birthday, and Labour Day. Otherwise, visitors can arrange a private tour or function or lend a hand at one of the working bees, where members of the Wrights Hill Fortress Restoration Society do general maintenance and restoration on this fascinating historical site.







Aotearoa's most diverse and abundant wildlife hotspots. Here, you can encounter albatross and delve deep underground to uncover some interesting human history as well. The Royal Albatross Centre gives visitors viewing access to the world's only mainland breeding

colony of northern royal albatross. Located at Taiaroa Head Nature Reserve, albatrosses find a sanctuary to raise their young. Now is the best time of year to glimpse freshly hatched chicks! Royal albatrosses, toroa, are one of the biggest sea birds. A graceful giant, their wingspan exceeds three metres. Their breeding season takes an entire year, so there is always something to see at the colony. Though they fly an estimated 19,000 kilometres per year and spend over 85 percent of their life out at sea, the northern royal albatross is endemic to New Zealand.





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


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### Home and away: the best of both


#### 10 years ago, I came on board with Regional News

Boro - Timeworn Textiles of Japan features Japanese textiles and garments drawn from the substantial collection of New Zealand artist Pip Steel and displays all kinds of items ranging from futon covers to 19<sup>th</sup>-century silk dolls, dusting cloths to aprons, work jackets to mittens, sake

or rice straining bags to braided rope, traditional

wrappings to fabric sample books, and everything in between. The exhibition aims to "highlight the beauty of these largely utilitarian garments and bags, that through their constant repair and reuse are elevated to objects greatly prized by collectors," Collins says. "Also to acknowledge the anonymous makers and menders of these fascinating pieced-together narratives." Typically made by women living in rural conditions from hand-spun and naturally dyed textiles, the

practice was particularly popular during the

19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries at a time in history

when cloth was a precious commodity. Boro was

mostly practised by "women who when they were

not working in the fields were creating beauty in every woven cloth, stitch, and application of cloth fragments", Collins continues. Many of the items on display have been passed down and cherished for generations. Japanese collector, social historian, and research scholar Tatsuichi Horikiri looks fondly upon the practice, expressing that in "seeing and holding these tattered garments used by farmers and villagers in times past, I cannot help but feel that they still exude the warmth and vigour of the bodies they once protected, and these scraps are trying to tell us their stories, provided that we only listen closely and with open hearts."

As for the exhibition at Pātaka, Collins hopes

alieNZ have touched down in Wellington. The mesmerisingly hued, intricately designed, and

heads originate from the mind of Kapiti-based creative Russell Woodley, who describes them as "cyborg things – part biological, part mechanical". "Integrating components of both technology and biology - and utilising everyday objects - no two are identical. Each head stands alone as a truly

fascinating one-off bespoke piece," he says. Woodley came up with the idea here on Earth when he happened across a skull that he wasn't able to identify. "I had the idea to add some clay to it to see what

it could be, but I never got round to doing that," he says. "However, it did inspire me. I thought 'Let'sa make an alien! It could be an alien skull'. I knew it wasn't, of course, but it did inspire me to start these things. It has become something of an obsession!" Now, he has brought more than 60 to life in vivid colours that are sure to delight any sci-fi fan or

eccentric art aficionado. With no moulds used in the process, every creation is unique and named after a different galaxy. "It takes about two days to make each one. I make them from the inside out. The last thing to go on is the paint. I put the eyes on when I'm covering with the clay," Woodley explains. "The clay that I use you

can paint straight away; you don't have to wait for it to dry. And then you get the whole complete thing in one colour, basically. I do use other colours as well but getting the paint on them is what I can't wait to do. I use really good paint and tiny brushes because I really want to be part of it. I don't use sprays or anything. I go to the little shops at rubbish tips and look at objects that basically don't mean anything much to anybody and just put them on the heads." Woodley says that his target audience is young people first and foremost, though his alieNZ would appeal to anyone searching for an interesting conversation piece for their desk, lounge, office, or

forth from every seam? How to recall its essence, its mythical whisperings? Together with my colleague Maddi and her friend Toula, my fiancé Jas and I were lucky enough to spend a night on Kapiti Island. A mere 15-minute boat ride from the mainland, it seemed like a

distant world of ancient secrets and untold stories. Our guide led us through Rangatira Point's grass and wetlands, signalling bird calls and spotting geckos along the way before relinquishing us to the forest. We felt a new sense of vigour wash over us. Up, up, above the clouds we scrambled along the Trig Track. As we passed trees born an age before ourselves, we began to step in tune with the bush. Slowly, the curious birds revealed themselveshīhī/stitchbird, kakariki/parakeet, toutouwai/ robin, kākā – each one allowing us to enter their tiny world for a moment. Having been blessed with a hot, clear day, the views at the summit were breathtaking. And following an amble down the Wilkinson Track, the crystalline water called. As the sky turned hues of primrose, periwinkle, and powder pink, we settled into our cabins in Waiorua Bay. As guests of Kapiti Island Nature Tours, we were served decadent kai and ambrosian wine. When the curtain of night fell, we crept through the undergrowth, spotting kororā/little blue penguin and ruru/morepork soundtracked by wētā and illusive kiwi. Stretching out across the dew-drenched grass, admiring the heavens dotted across the velveteen sky, we couldn't help but feel blessed to have explored this magical corner of this whenua we get to call home. 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



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
